I am impressed that NCECA has diversified the variety of programs to match the diversity within the exhibition side of the conference. I have always thought the programming was more conservative than the work that was on display in NCECA shows. Glad to see this is changing and represents a major step to modernize the organization and conference.

For newcomers I have a few pieces of advice for your first conference. First, make a plan. Mine is flexible but I always start with a plan. My first conference was in 2001 for the Charlotte, NC NCECA. I spent most of my time wondering around lost and overwhelmed. Don't let this happen to you. You might only get to talk to them for three minutes before they rush off to their next event but you will be glad you did. The ceramic world is thankfully not Hollywood. Most people will be flattered you took an interest in their work.
